



UK Key Cities 2021

In conjunction with Ramidus Consulting, we have updated the St Bride's Annual UK Key Cities Index. This was first launched in 2011. Our aim is to identify those centres with the best long-term investment potential. The index is based on six socio-economic and property drivers:

- Population Size and Projected Growth.
- Gross Value Added and Business Density.
- Business and Financial Services Employment.
- Education, Employment and Pay.
- The Size and Change in the Volume of Commercial Stock.
- · House Prices.

The UK Key Cities Index comprises 35 centres which are categorised as large (over 200,000 population) or small (120,000 - 200,000 population). The index excludes London which is more appropriately covered by the St Bride's World Cities Index and where it continues to be ranked No.1.

General Findings

The populations of all the larger cities (over 200,000) have increased over the year.

Projections suggest that population growth will continue across the board through to 2029, although rates of growth will vary widely.

Seven of the top 35 centres have office markets larger than 10 million sq ft – Birmingham, Bristol, Cardiff, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Leeds and Manchester. Only Liverpool (ranked 40) is not in the top 35 centres.

Unemployment data has been taken as at January 2021 and has inevitably been impacted by the COVID-pandemic. Generally, the more industrial city economies have been affected most by unemployment, as have their house prices and weekly pay.

Wycombe is now part of a Unitary Authority with Buckinghamshire which appears to have negatively impacted on its score this year.

2021 Results

There have been no promotions or relegations from this year's Top 35 UK Key Cities.

Even so, there has been some 'shuffling of the pack'.

Edinburgh continues to be ranked Number 1.

The most significant advancements are Oxford and Swindon (each up 7 places) and Manchester and Leeds (each up 5 places).

The largest fallers have been Wycombe (down 10 places), Bournemouth (down 7 places) and Bracknell (down 5 places).

Just over half of the total (18/35), and 7 of the top 10 centres are in the South East and East.

There are five Northern towns – Manchester (14=), Warrington (18=), Leeds (22=), Harrogate (22=) and Salford (32=).

There are five in the South West and Wales – Bristol (7=), Bath (14=), Swindon (22=), Cardiff (30) and Bournemouth (34).

There are four in the Midlands – Stratford-upon-Avon (7=), Warwick (11=), Solihull (17) and Birmingham (35).

There are three in Scotland – Edinburgh (1), Aberdeen (26=) and Glasgow (26=).

Over half (20) of the Top 35 centres are smaller towns with populations of 120,000 - 200,000.

Six of the centres are located along the Western Corridor - Wokingham (3), Windsor & Maidenhead (4), Reading (6), Bracknell (16), Swindon (22=) and Slough (31).

Four of the centres are located along the Oxford - Cambridge Arc - Milton Keynes (7=), Cambridge (13), Oxford (18=) and Bedford (26=).

St Bride's Managers Recommendations

By overlaying data on investment and leasing activity and transparency, we are able to further rank the top centres in each of the three principal commercial asset classes. Based on this, our long-term recommendations (in alphabetical order) are:

Offices	Bristol, Edinburgh*, Leeds, Manchester, Oxford - Cambridge Arc and (selectively) the Western Corridor.				
Industrial	Bristol, Leeds, Manchester, Milton Keynes, Warrington and (selectively) Western Corridor.				
Retail	Bristol, Edinburgh*, Guildford, Leeds, Manchester and St Albans
