The world's population is growing rapidly and we will see the arrival of the eight billionth child in the next few years. The sharpest growth is expected in Africa, Asia and Latin America. Europe, on the other hand, expects a declining population. Most of the world's growth will be in urban locations, putting even more pressure on our cities, especially in the way they are managed and developed.



During this anticipated period of rapid growth, investors will need to be selective in their choices. To this end, we have constructed the St Bride's World Cities model. This identifies the cities – not countries – that we recommend for investment over the coming years. The model is a risk management tool designed to identify the most secure destinations for long term investment. It does not seek to promote the prospects for individual properties or sector returns, but rather, to offer a clear pathway for investors to achieve a controlled exposure to their overseas investment.


The model is based around five themes which have been weighted according to our assessment of their importance - Constitution, Economic Strength, Business, Property Fundamentals and Desirability.


Weighted Themes to assess World Cities

Since the launch of the model in 2011, London has consistently been ranked the Number 1 World City. During that time, London's population has grown by over six hundred and fifty thousand (8.136 million to 8.788 million) and there is more to come. It is expected that the city's population will reach 10 million within the next decade. More people mean more housing and more social infrastructure such as schools, colleges, universities and healthcare – and of course, more places to work. It is inevitable that London's rising population will create even greater pressure on land use. As a result therefore, in our view, strong long-term property performance can therefore be anticipated.


